

# From Flying Saucer to Frishee



"Hundreds of flying saucers are going to invade San Luis Obispo." That was the first line of a California news story in 1948. But these flying saucers were not from outer space. They were on the shelves at the local store. Two men had just invented a new kind of toy. It was a flat plastic disk used to play catch. They called it the Flyin' Saucer.
